


Literacy Volunteers of Washington County will close for spring break from April 14-18 and reopen on April 21.

TUTOR TIPS

"We have met the enemy and he is us" Walt Kelly's Pogo

Have you ever tried to learn something new as an adult? Like Italian or the clarinet or mail merge? If so, you know what a process it is. Proficiency doesn't happen overnight. Some days you're on top of it; other days you've forgotten everything. On your path to mastery (or good enough), you face detours, peaks and valleys. You are often afraid of making mistakes. You may have felt nervous when called upon to show progress (a form of test or performance anxiety).

The same holds true for your students, of course. They are motivated to improve their English speaking, reading and writing skills to better their family and work situations. But learning the unruly English language (forget about idioms and accents!) is a formidable challenge. At LVWC, we (staff and tutors) try to provide a safe, welcoming place with one-to-one individual attention, tutor and student. It is well documented that we learn by making mistakes. But when we are afraid of doing so, our learning is slowed. We tend not to engage when we feel nervous or fearful.

In the last Tutor Tips column, I mentioned components of successful sessions with your students. Focusing, asking questions, listening actively, repeating, reinforcing and ending with a success, however small, were listed. (You've heard these before.) These strategies should be embedded in a safe environment where your student feels relaxed enough to make the inevitable mistakes.

When students register with LVWC and ask for a tutor, we try to impress upon them that this will be a partnership, requiring effort from both tutor and student. They may be appropriately nervous entering into an unknown situation. Tutors, too. But as you work together, you build trust. They feel more comfortable and engage/participate more. Your respectful tutoring provides the best environment. Ideally, as you navigate the uneven path to literacy together, you're both learning and making mistakes with gusto!

As spring approaches and the tourist season goes into high gear, our Block Island conversation class will take a break for the tourist season starting in May and will start up again in the fall.


We are still matching tutors with students, however.
